**Ball Lightning Project** 

Dear Sir,—'Ball lightning' is a short-lived, rare phenomenon often observed in connection with thunder-storms, but also seen under other atmospheric conditions. Its lifetime is of the order of seconds. It is often spherical, with a diameter of several centimetres. Because of its unfamiliar nature and rare occurrence, ball lightning may sometimes be reported in the context of unidentified flying objects, particularly since it can share many characteristics with those reported for UFOs, such as odours of sulphur or ozone, interference with electrical apparatus, burns, ground marks, etc.

A Project has been launched under the auspices of the British UFO Research Association (BUFORA) to collect and evaluate reports of ball lightning. We should be very grateful to receive reports of any observations which may bear relevance to ball lightning or similar phenomena. It Correspondence is invited from our readers, but they are asked to keep their letters short. Unless letters give the sender's full name and address (not necessarily for publication) they cannot be considered. The Editor would like to remind correspondents that it is not always possible to acknowledge every letter personally, so he takes this opportunity of thanking all who write to him.

Dear Mr. Bowen,—After reading the most interesting case history presented by Mr. Ernst Berger in FSR, Vol.23, No.1 ("'Snail feeler' enters room") I have two remarks I would like to make: (1) The Vienna case is remarkably similar to the case reported by Mr. M. Monnerie in LDLN, No. 131 ("Un nouveau cas de 'Lumière solide'"). (2) Mr. Berger's theory that non-illuminating light is a "direct" stimulus of the retina is untenable, because, quite apart from how such a "direct" stimulation would work, the resulting image wouldn't fit naturally

because it has been peculiarly apparent, during early 1977, that an unusual number of close encounters have occurred around the hours of 3 a.m. One can think of the Hainault landing case and the Nelson Vehicle stoppage affair (see FSR Vol. 23, No. 2).

Whilst it obviously remains possible that the military exercise was in some manner responsible for the experience, and was quite probably responsible for the noise, the events seem worthy of recording — just in case.

#### Time Travelling

Dear Mr. Bowen,-I would be grateful if you could allow me space in order to answer Reader S. Suddell's query on a point contained in my article on Time Travel (FSR Vol.21, No.6).

Mr. Suddell is concerned that our hypothetical Time Traveller from the year 2578 into our own time would be trapped in 1977 because, as I have suggested, the future, at any given

time, is as yet unformed.

I think the best way to answer this is to remind Mr. Suddell that our future, up to year 2578, is actually part of the Time Traveller's past; in other words, the sequence of events (which we call time) up to 2578 has, for the T.T., already happened. Wells made his Traveller able to journey far into the future, even unto the dying years of Earth itself; but Wells, after all, was writing fiction, and he did say later on in life that he considered the idea of Time Travel as "all nonsense." Be that as it may, when one contemplates the immense stretches of time which still lie ahead for the human race who can doubt that a Time-Travelling machine will eventually be invented, thus laying open for exploration and inspection all antecedent ages - including our own?

mothers of the neighbourhood got together at Janet's for coffee. They were sitting around the table when all of a sudden the storm door opened out, the house door opened in, the cat walked in, and the doors shut. Everyone just sat and looked without saying a word. Nobody mentioned it to Janet until two weeks later. They couldn't figure it out. Finally, somebody said, 'that was the strangest thing.' Janet said, 'Relax,

it happens all the time."

"The latest happening was on the 28th wedding anniversary of Janet and her husband. Since they were separating, Janet had to go out and get a job. Janet had been on the new job two days when all of a sudden the file racks were moving by themselves. Everybody (in the office) was saying, 'What's going on? Look at those racks, they never moved before. When Janet got home that night, she said to Hannah: 'Let me tell you, you stay home, or you can go to Grandmother's or to Sheila's, but you're not going to where I work.' But since some things have happened when Janet has been working, she has to keep reminding Hannah. In the meantime Janet's husband moved out. I guess Hannah was too much for him. He refused to admit Hannah'a existence for a long time, and would say, 'Don't talk about your imaginations and all.' One night Hannah really did a job on Janet's husband Donald.
